

## 3rd Grade Summer Work

### Welcome to Third Grade

The following is a list of supplies that your child will need:

#### To be purchased at any store:

12 - 2 pocket folders (please - none of the smaller, plain paper-type, or the plain hard plastic ones - they don't work as well for our needs)

3 - "marble" copybooks (the cover is usually black and white) (Please get the "wide ruled" lines, not the "college ruled")

Pencils - at least 3 at all times (Ticonderoga work the best) (you may send in a box or bag of pencils, and they can use them as needed)

Red pencils - at least 2 at all times

Erasers - white erasers work best

12" ruler with centimeters

Scissors

Glue - liquid white Elmers works best

1 - tea towel / placemat for lunch every day

Soft sided pencil case for supplies

3 boxes tissues

2 rolls paper towels

1 container Clorax wipes

1 hand sanitizer

Headphones (for classroom and Technology class use)

Crayons - (24 is fine)

OPTIONAL for the classroom

- Colored pencils (12 pack is fine)
- Markers (8 pack is fine)

ART BAG (to be left in the Art room)(in a gallon ziploc bag)

1 - 8 count watercolor

1 - 24 box crayons

All workbooks (soft covers) will need to be covered with clear contact paper in September (there will be 10-12 books/copybooks that will need to be covered).

Our 1 hardback textbook must be covered with a disposable cover (brown paper bag) or a (Book Sox - JUMBO/XL size only). We do have a 2nd hardback textbook which is optional to cover.

Please have your child fill in the information about themselves on the attached "A Poster All About....." sheet. We will be working with the information from that during the first two weeks of school.

The attached "Book Star" is for the FICTION book your child reads. The book should be appropriate for your child's reading level.

Please help your child choose an appropriate NON-FICTION book, also. There is a list of projects for your child to choose from. CHOOSE 1. The project your child chooses will be presented in class in September.

Please have your child fill out the attached book log with all the books/magazines/reading material they have read this summer.

All students entering 3rd Grade need to know their addition and subtraction facts (up to 18) quickly and correctly. Please use flashcards for 10-15 minutes per day, 4 days a week for the entire summer, so that your child is proficient with addition and subtraction facts. Beginning in September, there will be timed tests on addition facts. These tests will count towards their Math grade.


# Non-Fiction Choices

## Choose 1

<h3>Who Am I Riddle</h3>	<h3>Famous Figure Bookmark</h3>
<p>Using a riddle format, create a list of 7-10 riddle facts that would describe a character or a significant person in history about whom you read. Your riddle facts should show an understanding of character/person.</p>	<p>Make a bookmark to teach others about a topic. Pretend you work for an advertising company. Your bookmark will be a piece of promotional material to get people to learn about your topic. First, brainstorm a list of catchy phrases and creative wording for your topic. You can use a program on the computer, or a piece of construction paper. Use a ruler to divide a piece of construction paper into 4 sections. Write a catchy phrase advertising your topic and add an illustration on one side of the bookmarks and information about the topic on the other side. These should be written neatly and be colorful.</p>
<p>Example:</p>	
<p>I am a yellow pudgy bear. I love to eat honey. My best friend is a piglet.</p>	
<h3>Comic Strip</h3>	<h3>Shape Poem</h3>
<p>Use your own artistic skills, or an online resource such as <a href="http://www.toondoo.com/">http://www.toondoo.com/</a> to create a comic strip illustrating the sequence of main events in your book. There should be a minimum of 5-8 panels (boxes) with appropriate dialogue and illustrations.</p>	<p>Create a picture poem for your non-fiction topic. To brainstorm, write down at least 5 sentences about your topic. You should be creative with the wording, but it does not need to rhyme. On blank paper, lightly draw (in pencil) the outline of the object you choose to represent your book. It should take up most of the paper. Use your drawing to guide you as you write your poem around the shape.</p>
	<p>Example: Topic - electricity Shape - light bulb</p>
<h3>Bio Timeline</h3>	<h3>Travel Brochure</h3>
<p>Create a timeline of 7-10 dates for a major event in history, or for the life of a significant person. Be creative and use logic and artistic skills to create your timeline. Use images (pictures) and words. This should look neat and organized.</p>	<p>You will create a travel brochure that describes a variety of settings that a character in your story experiences, or for a place that you read about in your non-fiction book. Use specific details.</p>
